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this highly original book opens up the almost entirely neglected area of the black african presence in western europe during the renaissance covering history literature art history and anthropology it investigates a whole range of black african experience and representation across renaissance europe from various types of slavery to black musicians and dancers from real and symbolic africans at court to the views of the catholic church and from writers of african descent to black african criminality their findings demonstrate the variety and complexity of black african life in fifteenth and sixteenth century

Europe and how it was affected by firmly held preconceptions relating to the African continent and its inhabitants reinforced by Renaissance ideas and conditions of enormous importance both for European and African history. This book mixes empirical material and theoretical approaches and addresses such issues as stereotypes, changing Black African identity and cultural representation in art and literature.

negative images of africa which define the continent as being riven with poverty crime or war are increasingly being challenged examples of soft power such as nigeria s nollywood athletic successes in kenya rwanda s commercial diplomacy and south africa s liberal constitution are all reasserting african agency and shaping more positive understandings of the continent this book considers the role and impact of soft power in the african context and how it relates to the 21st century scramble for africa bringing together leading scholars in the field this book delves into various aspects of soft power in africa shedding light on how the continent s attractiveness is shaped by soft power in the continent s biggest states the small states and also the regional organisations such as the african union au economic community of west african states ecowas southern african development community sadc and east african community eac the book then goes on to assess the ways in which great powers most notably china the united states the united kingdom brazil and france are themselves deploying soft power in africa in order to vie for influence resources and strategic advantages understanding soft power in africa will be an important read for researchers in political science international relations african studies and cultural studies as well as for african policymakers

developing africa new horizons with afrocentricity aims to contest the eurocentric narrative of an african development discourse this book deploys the theory of afrocentricity as an intellectual standpoint from which african thinkers should interrogate and reconceptualize the discourse of development in africa particularly the book argues in favour of the afrocentric re interpretation of african history african culture and assertion of african agency as the core building wedge in the reconceptualization of the ideal african development trajectory

the african continent is in the midst of a renaissance of monumental proportions as a result the dawn of the new millennium constitutes an exciting period of change and opportunity for all those interested in the future evolution of the african continent and its peoples schraeder p j african politics and society 2000 2 president thabo mbeki of south africa the current chairman of the african union is being associated in a special way with the concept of african renaissance mbeki s notion of renaissance is fundamentally african political renewal and economic regeneration ajulu r 2001 in review of african political economy vol 24 no 1 87 february 27 42 the concept of african renaissance which is in vogue in political and academic circles encapsulates a vision of rebirth of africa as the african peoples come to terms with the challenges of the 21st century it is a vision that eschews the dictatorships economic mismanagement suppression of the civil society and ascendancy of state monopoly of power that have hitherto characterized the operations of post independence african governments it is a vision that rejects according to the constitutive act of the african union the policy of tolerating in its membership those african leaders who obtain power in their countries undemocratically unlike the toleration of dictators that characterized the organization of african unity the predecessor of the african union this book aims at being part of that vision and that is why its title is education for renaissance in africa it aims at showing the centrality of education in the achievement of that vision indeed it is obvious to all that african renaissance is primarily a mental achievement or simply an educational achievement if we are to contribute anything to the political or economic order for the development of africa we must have acquired certain kinds of knowledge and attitudes that involve commitment to our goals as prerequisites for any action that can change society however it is the

contention of this book that education for the renaissance of africa must not be haphazard it must be conceptualized in a manner that lays foundations for its effective working in the practical order the philosophy of education envisaged here has to be liberating characterized by creativity and social commitment which presupposes social consciousness here we define the notions of liberation creativity and social consciousness and strives to situate these concepts within a historical trajectory that not only includes africa but other parts of the world as well we have tried to show the suppression of african subjectivity during the colonial period with the result that liberation creativity and social consciousness were inhibited in both the educational and other spheres of life we argue that humans are radically free and that they need not succumb to this kind of socialization which has tended to negate their subjectivity we note in particular that kenyan educational commissioners have been cognizant of the harm that was done to african subjectivity by the colonial and missionary experience we also consider to what extent if any the philosophy of education as an academic discipline has prepared teachers for the challenging task of making education liberating creative and imbued with social consciousness we suggest ways in which the training of teachers can best fulfill these worthy goals of education we address the nature of social consciousness which we consider to be central to the learner's involvement in development of his or her country we have endeavored to discuss the minimal and heroic forms of consciousness as exemplified in such leaders as martin luther king mahatma gandhi and leaders of african liberation struggle an attempt is made to come to terms with diversity in social consciousness and to seek ways of living on the basis of unity in diversity

with the help of discourse analysis and ideology critique ellen wesemüller establishes a theoretical framework to analyze african nationalism in apartheid and post apartheid south africa following the constructivist school of thought the study adopts the assumption that nations are imagined communities which are built on invented traditions it shows that historically and analytically there are two distinct concepts of nationalism constitutional and ethnic nationalism these concepts can be retraced in south africa where they form the central antagonism of black political thought the study of post apartheid african nationalism is placed in its historical perspective by focusing on the major milestones of african national congress discourse before and during apartheid it demonstrates that throughout its history the anc was characterized by the rivalry between concepts of constitutional and ethnic nationalism while the former concept found its counterpart in charterism the latter was adopted by african nationalism though the anc in its majority embraced charterism it continually played with the appeal of an exclusive racial nationalism the theoretical and historical contextualization of the book allows for the investigation of the various dimensions of current anc discourse on african nationalism wesemüller analyses different concepts of nationalism employed by the anc and compares these models to those discussed in academic literature she concludes that in post apartheid south africa the historical dichotomy of africanist and charterist nationalism persists within the anc while early concepts of nationalism like mandela's rainbow nation and mbeki's i am an african paid tribute to charterism the discourses on the african renaissance and mbeki's two nation address at least leave openings for africanist interpretations furthermore the analysis shows that nationalism is not only a product of discourse but also one of material conditions the study provides evidence that it is

not only the ANC that hijacks African nationalism in order to mobilize their electorate and push through unpopular policy choices also there are compelling material reasons for some South Africans to adopt a nationalist agenda. This is demonstrated by the new Black bourgeoisie that mediates the gap between rich and poor as well as Black and white African nationalism. In this regard, it serves to legitimate domination and existing relations of inequality. It affirms an African elite while neither uplifting the majority of African poor nor threatening the material privileges of white South Africans. Lastly, Ellen Wesemüller gives an outlook on the political implications of a resurrected nationalism. The effects can be analyzed according to the two promises of nationalism: superiority over outsiders and equality between insiders. Superiority in post-apartheid South Africa is established over other African countries, immigrants, and inner South African groups that are considered foreign.

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
